1. Title of the Scientific Group

Exploring the Impact of Youth Sexuality and Romantic Relationships on Marriage Delays and Celibacy in Asia

2. Rationale for the Theme

Marriage patterns across Asia are undergoing significant transformations, as increasing numbers of young individuals opt to delay marriage or remain single. This phenomenon contributes to declining fertility rates and an aging population. The dynamics surrounding these trends are influenced by shifting attitudes toward sexuality, romantic relationships, and intimacy; however, their demographic and health implications are still inadequately addressed.

In East Asia, particularly in Japan and South Korea, economic pressures and evolving gender norms have led to postponed union formation. Conversely, in South Asia, including countries such as Iran and India, traditional cultural expectations often conflict with modern aspirations, creating complex challenges. Meanwhile, Southeast Asia, exemplified by Indonesia, showcases a blend of traditional values and globalization that profoundly impacts youth behavior.

This Scientific Group (SG) aims to investigate how varying perceptions of sexuality and romantic relationships contribute to these demographic shifts. By providing critical insights into population health—such as mental well-being and reproductive health—and social structures—including family support dynamics and labor market implications—our work has the potential to inform public policy on youth welfare, gender equity, and population sustainability. This theme is thus highly relevant for encouraging cross-national dialogue within the APA and related disciplines.

5. Objectives and Provisional Program of Activities (June 2025–December 2027)

Objectives

- 1. To investigate the influence of youth sexuality and romantic relationships on marriage delays and celibacy across Asia.
- 2. To map regional variations in these trends and identify the underlying factors.
- 3. To assess the impacts on population health and socioeconomic outcomes.
- 4. To develop interdisciplinary analytical frameworks.
- 5. To formulate evidence-based policy recommendations.

Provisional Program

Year 1 (June 2025–May 2026): Foundation Phase

- **Inaugural Workshop (Q3 2025, Virtual):** Launch the SG, establish research priorities, and feature keynote presentations from members.
- **Literature Review (Q4 2025):** Compile existing studies and datasets on youth sexuality and marriage trends.
- Call for Proposals (Q1 2026): Fund 3–5 pilot studies through APA or external grants.

Year 2 (June 2026–December 2027): Research and Impact Phase

- Symposium (Q2 2026, APA Conference): Present findings from pilot studies and host a policy panel discussion.
- **Field Research (Q3–Q4 2026):** Conduct empirical studies in Iran, China, India, Pakistan, utilizing surveys and focus groups.
- Policy Brief/Webinar (Q1 2027): Disseminate findings to relevant stakeholders.
- Culminating Conference (Q2 2027, Hybrid): Launch a comprehensive book or special journal issue.

Ongoing activities will include quarterly virtual meetings and the establishment of an APA webpage dedicated to project resources.

6. Planned Outputs and Outcomes

Outputs:

- 1. Working paper based on workshop outcomes (2025).
- 2. Annotated bibliography and data repository (2026).
- 3. 3–5 peer-reviewed articles (2027).
- 4. Policy brief and accompanying webinar (2027).
- 5. Edited volume or special issue in a relevant journal (e.g., Asian Population Studies, 2027).

Outcomes:

- 1. Enhanced understanding of the role of youth sexuality in demographic changes.
- 2. Evidence-based policy recommendations to support youth health and family dynamics.
- 3. Strengthening the APA network for collaborative, cross-national research initiatives.
- 4. Provision of mentorship opportunities for early-career researchers.

7. Resources and Funding
